This week in RE

We are now in the second week of our topic on the Sacraments. This week we have focussed on the Sacrament of Baptism and have learned about how we are welcomed into God's family. The children role played a baptism and we had a Mummy and a Daddy, Godparents, children in the family and a priest. The photos of our mock Baptism are in our RE Big Book. If you'd ever like to see this, just ask as we display it on our prayer table.



Sorting

This week in Maths, we have continued work on sorting and have moved onto estimating and comparing. To support your child with this work, please carry out the following tasks.

Task 1

Ask your child to sort mixed objects such as buttons, Lego bricks or teddies into groups of their choice. They may choose to sort by colour, or shape or size etc...

On completion, ask them to estimate which group has 'more.' We have used this vocabulary in class this week, so the children should be familiar with it. Then explain, 'you've estimated that there are more red bricks. How can we check?' This will lead on to counting and will help your child develop their touch counting skills when they discover the group that has more.

Extension

If your child copes well with this task, extend it by encouraging them to work out how many more objects are in one group compared to another. A good way to do this visually, is to build towers. This way, the children can clearly see how many extra ('more') bricks there are.

Storytime Phonics

We've also displayed the books we have shared together with their accompanying phonemes (sounds).




