We have reached the end of our third week and the children have made a good start to the academic year. <u>Spelling</u>

Each week we will provide the children with 10 spellings to learn. These will be a combination of the spelling pattern we have been practising and in addition from words from the Years 3/4 and 5/6 spelling lists.

Spellings need to be practised at home and a spelling test each week is held on Thursday.
