Happy Chinese New Year



Topic News

This week we have continued to learn about Chinese New Year. The children have listened to Chinese drummers and have learned to alter dynamics, tempo and rhythm when drumming for themselves. (Please read this week's Tapestry observations.) The children used The Chinese New Year story to help them learn about positional language in the classroom, in the garden and in PE lessons. The children have also looked at Chinese writing and have worked hard to use Chinese characters to help them write their own names. Today to help the children understand about the Chinese Lantern Festival, the children made red paper lanterns, practising their cutting skills as they worked.

Maths Work

This week in Maths we have worked on positional language. We ask that as you are out and about with your child during half term, you support them to understand and use the vocabulary shown on the right.

As well as working on positional language, please continue to ensure that your child recognises numerals to 10 and if your child is secure within this number range, work with them on recognising random numbers in the 1-20 range. An online game to support this is found on the Topmarks website and is called helicopter rescue. Please follow this link

We have taught the children most of the words on the Phase 2 and Phase 3 lists and are working through Phase 4 words. Please take time on a regular basis to refer to these words with your child.
