Following on from yesterday's activity linked to paying for fruit using 1p coins and then solving money problems, today we have an online game for you to play with your child, that starts at a basic level but

can be adjusted to provide higher levels of challenge. Please go to

When on this screen above, select 1p (Up to 10p)



When on this screen, you will be shown a range of toys costing different amounts. Your child will need to read the price tag and then click on the coins at the bottom of the screen in order for the money to appear next to the toy.

When they have enough money to pay, click check.

***Task

If this game is too easy for your child and you feel that they really understand how to pay for items with 1p coins, try this alternative.

Click on Menu in the top left hand corner of the screen and go to the 2p(Up to 20p) option.

This time your child will need to count in 2s as they pay for items.

To explore number bonds and how higher value coins combine to make greater totals you could watch and discuss this BBC Bitesize clip with your child.






After you've watched and discussed the clip and have answered the questions in the quiz, please look at The Resources for Today.


