This week we have worked on practical adding.

To support your child in their learning, please carry out the following tasks,

Using objects such as coins, buttons, counters etc... ask your child to roll a dice and count out the number of objects that matcl the dice. Ask your child to repeat this process and then work together to help them count how many they have altogether. Repe range of adding sums.

Similarly, you could say a number up to 5, ask your child to show you that number of fingers and then ask them to show another other hand, they could then put the fingers together to count them and find the total.

If this is easy for your child, perhaps use the number track above. Use the dice as described above and this time, ask your child finger on that number, roll the dice again and encourage them to 'count on' to find the answer. Repeat as necessary and if applic for your child with larger numbers, repeat the process and model the language as described.
